Back in 1981 when I established Untouched World Ltd,
New Zealand was largely a primary industry farming based
economy. Untouched World Ltd pioneered the development
of luxury knitwear using New Zealand's finest natural fibres
such as Merino, superfine mohair and Cashmere. Untouched
World Ltd garments are made in New Zealand and sold
in Australasia, North America, Europe and Asia. I became
concerned as I travelled around the world with my suitcases
of knitwear samples, that the planet was unable to support
the current trajectory of growth. Already whole tracts of

ocean were so polluted that they no longer supported life of any kind; indigenous peoples were being made homeless by climatic effects of the relentless harvesting of forests and entire wildlife habitats were disappearing. The Western world was focused on GDP growth at any cost, while the third world struggled to survive. The world was clearly interdependent, yet recognition of these issues and more so, action to reverse the direction in which we were all headed was slow to come

So what could be done about it?

From the establishment of Untouched World Ltd in 1981, long before the word 'sustainability' was used or heard in a business context, our philosophy has been to provide a platform for growth of the human spirit based on a foundation of environmental sustainability and renewal.

Advanced Leadership Programme

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education strategy

Quality education (for both students and teachers) from our programmes has ensured that localised school and community initiatives are better informed and focused on achieving long-term, sustainable outcomes. Untouched World™ Foundation programmes are focused on achieving six key education outcomes.

- **1.** A learner centred environment that respects and values new thinking.
- **2.** The challenging of learners to explore positive solutions/strategies to help address the need to use resources wisely and in the most sustainable way.
- **3.** A focus on learning based on personal change and transformation through reflective practice. Guided reflective practice allows individuals to unpack their beliefs and ideas related to a particular experience or set of experiences. Individuals can then construct their own understandings that lead to new thinking.
- **4.** Development of innovation and creativity by providing opportunities for learners to try out new ideas by connecting and integrating different strategies with appropriate guidance from appropriate mentors.
- **5.** Young adults thinking critically through implementing and evaluating new ideas in practical situations.
- **6.** Connecting social, economic and environmental thinking, with knowledge and action capability.

fieldwork programmes & strategies

At a practical level, Untouched World Foundation programmes focus on biodiversity...

Blumine Island - Marlborough and in particular, the preservation of our national bird, the Kiwi and the brand identity issues for all New Zealanders of 'what it means to be a Kiwi'. In the middle of our second decade, a major strategic focus on water has been added with Waterwise programmes added in Canterbury and Otago. These programmes explore multi-stake holder impacts on water use, quality and distribution. Based at Taumutu Marae and Cromwell, Central Otago. The complex interactions between economic environmental and social needs, forms the basis of students gaining and contributing to broad understanding of a key nation and international resource.

Strategic Focus

kiwi conservation

Our strategic focus around New Zealand's national bird, the Kiwi, emerged from working over the years with DOC on two mainland sanctuaries, the Kariori Rahui in Ohakune National Park and the West Coast's Okarito, home to the most endangered Kiwi sub-species, the Rowi.

Our long-standing commitment to the restoration of Blumine Island over the past twenty years, has now established the island as a 'predator free' sanctuary island.





students experience conservation

Take 20 young people from around the South Island and deposit them at Taumutu Marae at Lake Ellesmere for seven days... and they emerge as a band of eco-warriors ready to battle for our waterways, forests and wildlife.

life changing

A quiet student who reserved my passion and knowledge of the world around me; this was perhaps the most accurate description of me before I was blessed with the opportunity to attend the Ruapehu Kiwi Forever Programme. The experience gave me the chance to grow, to realise my own potential, while working with others so that we may all contribute to a sustainable future. It was the first time in my life that I was able to take ownership of my learning. Being handed the reins was daunting at first, but I quickly decided that I wanted to test the limits, to see what I was really capable of. It wasn't until I reflected on the experience, that I noticed the changes in myself. I had been equipped with invaluable skills that have been and always can be applied into everyday life. I also realised we must be active in the sharing of our knowledge, showing others the excitement of making a difference no matter how small. However, it is through personal experience, through programmes like these, that we deepen our understanding.

Kiwi Forever has been a prominent changing point in my life, an experience that helped me grow as a person, so that I may take ownership of my future, and make sure it is a sustainable one. Currently I am in my 2nd year at Massey University. I am pursuing my interest in understanding the Earth and how it works, but also social geography. I am fascinated by the interactions between people and our environment and the impacts they have on one another, so I am hoping to do postgrad work in the next few years to further my knowledge. I would also like to travel overseas to explore the areas I have been learning about, because as earlier mentioned, personal experience deepens our understanding. The entire programme was a crucial experience for me in reaffirming the idea of my role in the future. I am now a determined young woman, with a thirst to share and integrate the experiences, knowledge and leadership skills in my life, but also into the lives of others. As a young adult, I am more than happy to share my experience, however, in doing so I hope to ignite a curiosity in those I talk to. I want them to become excited, to open their eyes to the world around them, to go out, explore, and then do the same.

Strategic Focus

water wise

Our strategic focus around water has emerged due to the increasing impact of human activity on, the mixed demands for, and the economic realities surrounding water resources, highlighted in a partnership with the Clinton Global Initiative. Our water programme is the main focus of our programme development — it focuses on a range of localities which demonstrate aspects of the challenges above and, as with the Kiwi strategy, ensures connected outcomes which empower young adults to make significant leadership contributions on a complex and essential issue.



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My Untouched World journey began on the Waterwise 2020 program. This program's purpose was to gain an understanding of the water quality issue in the Canterbury region. My intentions leading into this project, were strong on developing my Leadership capabilities, but to also create an awareness of one of the wicked issues New Zealand faces. This project expanded my perspective and curiosity, on what values I want to inflict onto a forever struggling environment.

So, through a deeply profound search in my logical self and emotion, I found that I wanted to focus on the cultural/people aspect of our society. The journey to an impactful future, comes from an embedded personal attachment to what is considered important to you. Mine's people, your's could be climate change, troubled youth, saving endangered animals, or even sustainable clothing, but I believe, if you place passion at the heart of what you do, then you're able to achieve any goal.



Giahni Paraku ADVANCED LEADERS PROGRAM Strategic Focus

Advanced Leaders Program (ALP)

In early 2019 we piloted our first Advanced Leadership (ALP) programme, at Mt Aspiring, working with exceptional-Graduate UWF rangatahi from across New Zealand. The question "what's next?" is often asked by students and stakeholders after an initial program experience with us in the field. Our aim with ALP is to go some way to answering this question directly, taking the passion of graduates (secondary and tertiary), and developing further their behaviour change and consequent action to positively impact their own growth and that of their communities—whether that be expressed through 'hands, head or heart'. Basically we're customising their leadership development be it towards further education, employment and/or service. A further three ALP programmes have been run, the second

at Jo John's Glenthorne Station in North Canterbury in late August 2019; then Covid-hit tourist center Kaikoura a year later, envisioning a 'moonshot' to leverage social cohesion and rangatahi well-being mindful of the enormous challenge pandemics can bring - and late March the 4th ALP held at Peel Forest in South Canterbury including developing staff succession. The ALP programs are 3-4 day intensives with up to 20 participants, designed and led entirely by UWF graduates - our adult staff and visitors, 'assets in the room.' As we enter our 3rd decade, their stair-casing importance and developmental impact will continue to grow.

Taking the lead teacher role on one of the earlier Blumine Island programs has led to two decades of association with the Untouched World Foundation in various capacities, not the least of which has been guiding the Blumine program through its many iterations. He has been able to assist in taking the learnings from these programs to inform the develop of other UWF programs in other contexts. In recent years, as a member of the UWF board, Peter has been working to establish a digital platform to help in data management, reconnecting with alumni and streamlining logistics to support the sustainable future of the Untouched World Foundation.



Caroline Hepburn-Doole

Growing up at the foot of the Waitakere Ranges Caroline's interest in the natural world began well before graduating from Otago University with a BSc in Ecology. After completing her BSc Caroline went on to pursue a BTchg (Sec), specialising in junior Science and senior Biology; with a particular emphasis on youth leadership and encouraging individuals to understand their place in the wider world and their responsibilities to it. Nurturing an environmental group to fruition, implementing a student-led school-wide waste reduction and recycling scheme; and seeing the embedding of an environmental prefect into the student leadership structure were all by-products of wanting to see students embark on their future lives, with a drive to do well by the planet.

Caroline now Heads Dunedin's residential hall, Knox College, where developing and implementing student-driven sustainable practices in a residential environment is a n ever evolving challenge.

Dr Barry Law has over 34 years' experience in the tertiary sector specialising in experiential learning, education for sustainability and behaviour change.

He has been involved in a number of UNESCO related activities in New Zealand, Australia, Japan, Canada, Thailand, Vietnam, France and Fiji. During 2005–2007 he was a member of the New Zealand UNESCO Decade for Sustainability Committee.

He co-wrote the Environmental Education Guidelines for NZ Schools (1999) and was the National In-service Coordinator for Education for Sustainability for the Ministry of Education (2003–2008).

Barry has been the Program Director to the Untouched World™ Foundation since its foundation and played an integral role in the Trust and Business, becoming a recipient of the UNESCO Decade for Sustainability logo in 2007.

He received a New Zealand Green Ribbon award for services to the Environment (1997), Outdoors New Zealand Excellence award for Environmental Leadership from the Sir Edmund Hillary Outdoor Pursuits Centre in 2007



Mark Prain Founding Director

Mark has been Founding Director of UWF since 2001, sharing Peri's passion for intergenerational justice and well-being. A Toi Whakaari Grad. (Wgtn.1978), after a 15 year professional career as an actor/singer/playwright, he spent the next 15 initially with Greenpeace and then with the sustainable business, media, urban design and govt. sectors in NZ and the US.

In 2006 with Sir Ed., Mark founded the Hillary Institute of International Leadership celebrating and working with ten global Hillary Laureates since 2009 - the current Laureate Christiana Figeures. In 2016 to challenge fading acuity he gained an Hons Masters in International Law and Politics from University of Canterbury. A sought after speaker globally he is an advisor to Climate Changers (US), CLIMB (Wales) and the Katerva Awards Program (Canada).



Matt Shepherd Rangatahi Chair

Matt Shepherd is a master's student in the School of Geography, University of Otago, with his research focused on the Atmospheric Sciences and Climate Change in Antarctica. He has recently become a member of WAI Wanaka team as Project Manager of the Wānaka Water Project. External to his academic research, his other interests are focused on Sustainability, Education for Sustainable Development (ESD) and Adaptions of Leadership through a crisis (COVID-19).

Matt has been a part of the Untouched World Foundation since 2017 and has partaken in Bluemine Island & Waterwise Otago programs. Matt has also led one of the Advanced Leadership Programs. In 2018 Matt represented Untouched World at the UNESCO 'Youth Saves the Planet' in Paris.



2021 update...

2020 was dominated by 'the gift of Covid-19', which of necessity called for a creative response and the re-framing of our field programs and broader aspirations with our senior rangatahi. At time of writing (July 2021), we've been able to mount (since June 2020) two advanced leadership programs (ALP), the first held in the relatively 'unwild' but seminal little sustainable tourist community of Kaikoura which badly needed support during Covid, and the second in mid-Canterbury at Peel Forest Eco Lodge.

The August ALP, with primary partner Rata Foundation, was literally a breath of invigorating, fresh air for all involved and had a number of positive outcomes, not least commitment to the development of three project strands; presented by the students, to Founder and Chair Peri Drysdale and her husband Alex. All goods and services for the weekend's mahi were sourced from the Kaikoura community and it was a very special 2020 opportunity for senior students and staff to gather, and productively korero on 'post-Covid' challenges ahead in the home rohe of senior UWF mentor/teacher Peter Sutton.

ALP 4, March 2020. Facilitated by Matt Shepherd and fellow graduates, outcomes at Peel Forest included a strong focus on Tangata Tiriti/Te Ao Maori approaches to health and well-being, and "I Am Capable" * 'pizzas' applied to stair-casing rangatahi development, alongside utility of the SDGs as a matrix and (staff) succession-planning.

We also managed to mount two annual (30 participant), summer "Waterwise" programs in Canterbury and Central Otago before Christmas and after a full year's delay, finally achieved landfall with our new intensive field program in the far north – Ngā Tupuranga o Te Taitokerau, launched at the national Marae, (Te Tii) in Waitangi. This program is a partnership with Ngapuhi as mana whenua, central government through Ministry of Youth Development (MYD), Northland Regional Council (NRC), and Northtec. Initial stakeholder reviews strongly demonstrate the investment has borne fruit and will continue in 2022.

financials

Financially the Foundation had to cope with a dramatic, Covid-related, reduction in core funding from its parent Untouched World™ which normally underwrites around 45% of revenues. The re-engagement of MOUs with a number of our Program Associates* throughout NZ and the careful, financial oversight of Leech & Co (full 2020 financials available), has however allowed us to see through some very difficult months and we as a consequence ended the 2020-21 year in a position which maintains viability. RATA FOUNDATION'S core, local partner contributions alongside Untouched World™ are also consolidating as we journey into 2021-22. We thank you all!

Updated advice in our July 21 meeting from the ED, allows us to proceed with renewed confidence into the next financial year on current program projections, and we welcome receipt of a second tranche of new funds from Goldman-Sachs Gives who stepped in during 2020. A further two field programs and at least one further ALP program are scheduled during the remainder of the 2021 calendar year. Staffing remains stable with lead teachers and Program Director Dr Barry Law continuing to do fine work, (@ Covid-related reduced rates), and a focus on staff succession starting to take shape.

20 years...

2021 is the Foundation's 20th operating year birthday (and our origin company's 40th!). While details are yet to be finalised we will celebrate this remarkable milestone and also return to our original site, Blumine Island in the Marlborough Sounds late in the year. We hope you, our partners, graduates, friends and whanau will join us. A major graduate search program is underway, led by Peter Sutton, to reach out to and re-involve our 'Alumni Class' of over 2000 from around 80 programs since 2001.


